Lee Tedone: The Palms Nurturing Lead Receptionist By Jeri O'Neill

No matter how busy she is, Lee Tedone, Lead Receptionist, always has a smile on her face and a kind word to say to everyone who stops by The Palms Front Desk.

For the majority of her life, Lee has worked in fields where nurturing is required: she's been a Candy Striper, a nurse, a mother, a childcare provider, and now a retirement community receptionist.

They chose to live in San Luis Obispo because Bruce was already employed as a high school chemistry instructor.

Bruce's dad, Lou Tedone, was the first pediatrician in SLO. Lou hired Lee to be his office nurse. Lee recalls that she had never been around children that much, and it was very challenging to deal with squirming little ones, especially when it was time to administer shots!

Lee started a childcare business in 1989 so she could stay at home with her daughters, Cara and Emily. As the girls grew, Lee was involved in their sports, dancing, and theatrical activities. In 2000, Lee became a wedding coordinator at the Old Mission.

While perusing the ads on SLOJobs.com in 2006, Lee saw a listing for a receptionist position at The Palms. Her vivacious personality won everyone over. When the Lead position was available in 2011, Lee was selected. "This is such a fun place to work; there's always a lot of laughing! and Teton National Parks, terminating in Salt Lake City!

In 1965, Mom and Dad moved us to New Jersey, settling in Morristown, 30 miles outside of New York City. Dad continued his career in the paper industry, and Mom oversaw the next several years of getting all three of us to college. Mom didn't let go of her music. She became a valuable member of the Morristown Presbyterian Church Choir, and was called on to solo regularly.

In the early 70s, Mom returned to work to help with those college bills, working at Silver Burdett Publishing, Co. in the Customer Service Department. She was with the company for 15 years before she retired. Once Mom and Dad were both retired, they spent time traveling to annual Wyckoff Family Reunions wherever they were held around the country, as well as, visiting with their daughters. In the early 90s, Mom even traveled on her own, taking a trip to England with her sister Arlene.

In later years, Mom has enjoyed needlecraft. She even made a quilt that was auctioned off at a Wyckoff Family Reunion, as well as, some beautiful needlework samplers. Gardening in her New Jersey garden brought her lots of satisfaction, and numbers of young visitors. Dad died in 2000, leaving Mom alone in her home until 2009. Neighbors would look for her out in her garden, then would come over to visit. The neighborhood children would often come share stories of what was going on in their worlds with Mrs. Wyckoff, and they knew they would receive an enthusiastic audience! In the year before Mom came to Sydney Creek, her next door neighbor, Toby (age 9) would faithfully bring her her paper each morning on his way to catch his school bus!

Mom has enjoyed seeing her daughters become fulfilled women, with jobs, husbands, and children. She has always enjoyed talking with us about what is going on in our lives, and has always been there to extend a hand where possible. It's now our time to do all we can for her – we love you, Mom!

Resident Spotlight

- Ellen Wyckoff -

Ellen Elizabeth Graham was born on October 20, 1919 in Jersey City, NJ. She grew up in a small town not far from Jersey City named Dunellen, as the middle child in her family,



with an older brother, Wallis and a younger sister, Arlene.

Mom grew up with a love of music. When she was in high school, a neighbor, Mr. Summers, who produced plays in New York City, produced some local musicals in Dunellen, and Mom and her brother appeared in a couple of these. During her junior and senior years at Dunellen High School (Class of 1937), Ellen was president of the school's Glee Club. Her teacher, Miss Fisher, felt Mom had genuine singing talent, and was instrumental in helping Mom join a well-known New York City choral group of the time, The Robert Shaw Chorale.

Mom married Albert Clarence Wyckoff on August 31, 1940. She was working at Sears and Roebuck in New York City at that time, and for the first year of marriage, she did not wear her wedding ring to work, recognizing that being a married woman in the workforce was frowned upon. In June 1944, Mom and Dad reported to Camp Blanding, Florida, where he was assigned to a Prisoner of War camp. He and Mom spent the remainder of the War years at that base. While Dad was training troops for battle overseas, Mom was secretary to the Commandant of the Camp. Mom still has a photo album full of pictures and mementos from those years, including copies of documents she typed for the Commandant that cited promotions for the Camp's soldiers, including Dad.

After the War, Mom and Dad spent a few more years back in Dunellen. Mom rejoined The Robert Shaw Chorale, and on a few special occasions, she performed in a combined chorus under the baton of Fred Waring. By the time their first-born (Karen) came along in 1949, they were living in Troy, Ohio, where Dad worked as a chemical engineer for a division of International Paper. Mom stayed at home throughout their time in Ohio, raising three children (Karen, Joanne, 1951 and Mary, 1956.) Her desire to continue singing propelled her to seek out a sizeable church choir at Westminster Presbyterian Church in Dayton, Ohio, some 20 miles away, where she was a regular soloist.

During those Ohio years, our family learned to ice skate. Mom and Dad did pairs dancing, while we girls learned group routines. Our skating club had annual ice shows in which all five of us performed. We took lots of interesting trips together, too; summer vacations included trips in a WWII vintage camping trailer and going to places elsewhere in Ohio and the Midwest. The last summer before we moved, we took our biggest trip ever, all the way to Yellowstone

Fern Kerr would not take anything in exchange for the life she has lived. She was brought up to be a Christian, has a deep love for God, and she tries to live her life by the ways He has taught us to live.



Born on February 7th, 1919, in Regina Saskatchewan, Canada, Fern loved growing up on a farm. She was raised with two brothers and two half-brothers. She recalls how much fun she had as a little girl, playing in the barn loft and the straw stacks with them.

Fern's father was a wheat farmer, and everyone helped with the family business. They had eight horses and one milk cow. The horses were used when sowing the oats, and even the neighbors helped out. They would hire workers to run the threshing outfit. The threshing machine would bind and separate the wheat from the straw. A life-changing event came for the family when strong winds blew in from Kansas one year. The storm blew off all the wheat tops and devastated the farms. This is when Fern's father decided to visit family in the States.

Visiting the States was probably her greatest vacation ever! The trip to Iowa to see her aunts and uncles certainly helped her father to make the decision to head for warmer weather.

Fern was in the second grade when they made the move to California in their Chevy touring car. What a different way of life it was! She used to have to walk a little more than a mile to and from school, in freezing cold weather, but in sunny California she would play all day outside in her bobby socks and dresses.
