According to the CDC (Centers for Disease Control and Prevention), the upcoming season's flu vaccine will protect against the influenza viruses that research indicates will be most common during the season. This includes an influenza A (H1N1) virus, an influenza A (H3N2) virus, and one or two influenza B viruses, depending on the flu vaccine.

June Field's Trip of a Lifetime By Jeri O'Neill

June Fields is an Anglophile through and through. Her first trip to England occurred in 1961. Since then she has made the trek to London 22 times. June probably knows London better than Fodor's Travel Books. Consequently, last year, on November 5, she agreed to act as tour guide on a nine-day trek with her two nieces, Liz and Nancy Delphenich. June, a Brooklyn, NY transfer, had just downsized before her October cross-country move to The Palms.

This Great Britain trip would prove to be very different from her previous journeys. The flight took five hours longer than her customary departures from the east coast. Unlike other air voyages, June remained in her seat the entire time. Additionally, she didn't have her compression socks—victims of the recent downsizing. When she and her nieces landed, June felt fine. They had rented an apartment for their stay, so while June settled in, Nancy and Liz fetched dinner.

June planned a visit to London's famous shopping mall, Westfield, on the first day's agenda. On the way back from the mall, June didn't feel very well. The taxi driver asked if he could drop everyone off on the corner because of the heavy traffic. As June exited the cab, she immediately collapsed in the street. The last thing she remembered hearing was her niece shouting, "We need an ambulance!" In the midst of the confusion, her niece forgot that in Europe 999 is dialed instead of 911 for emergencies.

The ambulance was trapped in rush hour traffic. Time was of the essence, so the driver swerved the taxi onto the sidewalk to skirt the traffic jam! In the ER, June's heart stopped and a defibrillator was used to revive her. She also endured three blood transfusions and surgery.

Three days later, June awoke in an ICU. She had experienced a pulmonary embolism due to a blood clot sustained during her flight. June has no recollection of anything that happened during those crucial days. "It's probably a good thing I don't remember!," she confessed. It was touch and go for five days, but the medical personnel were attentive, dedicated, and caring.

Even though June was very weak, she wasn't about to let her confinement ruin the trip for her nieces! When they visited every day, she provided them with a new itinerary. The apartment landlady generously extended their occupancy for six additional days without charge. They returned to the U.S. on Thanksgiving Eve.

All told, June's hospital stay lasted 30 days. Thanks to her travelers' insurance, she received a fantastic nurse escort. He whisked her through Heathrow and LAX. When she arrived at French Hospital with a four page medical summary from England, she expected to be admitted. Much to her surprise, the ER physician decided that she had made such a remarkable recovery, she could go home.

According to June, "Anyone who worries about socialized medicine, shouldn't!" Everything was top notch, including MRIs, physical therapies, and medications. The cost couldn't be beat either: her EOB for the British ER, attended by three doctors, totalled \$1,100. Pretty cheap for a trip of a lifetime!

Resident Spotlight:

- Stubbie Fasig -

The first half century of Stubbie Fasig's life is a travelogue right out of Fodor's. She was an April baby born in Taft, California, to British parents. Unaccustomed to the hot dry deserts of Taft (they had moved to the oil-rich place from a beautiful home in cool, green England), they decided to move to the more moderate city of Long Beach, California. Stubbie's father worked hard drilling oil and fighting derrick fires, and soon his expertise took him to India. Stubbie and her family traveled to Kashmir to vacation while her father worked abroad.

After India, Stubbie's family moved to Montebello, California, when her father took a chance at purchasing a salted gold mine with a partner. When that didn't work out as planned, he took his family on another adventure abroad to Austria while he continued drilling oil. Her family moved to England after their brief stay in Hungary and moved on to Ancon, Ecuador where they nested for ten years.

As a young adult, Stubbie started working as a payroll clerk at a military base until she and her family moved once again back to California. She continued working as a payroll clerk and her mother became a switchboard operator at what is now known as Vandenberg Air Force base. She was transferred to Tokyo, Japan and later to Wiesbaden, Germany before returning to California where she stayed at Edwards Air Force Base for five years.

In 1956, Stubbie married Bob Fasig and together they traveled to Fukuoka, Japan, where they lived for three years. Then it was on to Spokane, Washington and next to Sacramento, California. After Bob retired from the military in 1963, they bought land in both Monterey and San Luis Obispo counties. Stubbie would live in Atascadero for 33 years before moving to The Village at The Oaks in 2004, where she made many cherished friends. Today, she makes her home at Garden Creek where she continues to make new friends.

Stubbie has been called by her familiar nickname since early child-hood. Where did it come from? Guess you'll just have to ask her!

Purpose. For all of us, and at any stage in our lives, having a sense of **purpose** is key to achieving a high sense of life satisfaction! However, it was Eric Erikson, the famous psychologist, who developed Erikson's Stages of Psychological Development, that summarized psychological development from infancy through maturity (age 65 to death). It is the latest stage of this framework that is of concern to us in the field of aging!

In this stage, Erikson calls it "Ego Integrity vs. Despair" which in lay terms means that people reflect back on the life they have lived and come away with either a sense of fulfillment from a life well lived, or a sense of regret and despair over a life misspent. Those who feel proud of their accomplishments will feel a sense of integrity or purpose! Those who are unsuccessful during this phase may feel that their life has been wasted and will experience many regrets and will be left with feelings of bitterness and despair. Now, add all this psychological processing on top of a diagnosis of dementia, and not only would these feelings be difficult to express but difficult for any of us to appreciate or validate!

These are important tenets of the care we provide here at Sydney Creek ... to understand our residents, provide them with purpose, and an opportunity to somehow express themselves during this last stage of our human development. You will see this reflected in our growing and changing Life Enrichment highlights and calendar! Come see how we find purpose here at Sydney Creek! Every one of us are valuable ... all the way through the stages of our human development.

Resident Spotlight

- Jan Clucas -

Janice (Hendricks) Clucas was born on February 27, 1922, in Orange, New Jersey. She was the youngest of four children.

Her younger years were spent in New Jersey and on Long Island, N.Y. Her father was the Vice President of the Thomas Publishing Company in New York City, and her mother was a Grand Matron of the Eastern Star for the State of New Jersey. She



fondly remembers huge family gatherings of aunts, uncles, and cousins coming to her grandfather's house at Christmas and other holidays. Summers were frequently spent with her family at the Jersey Shore. Jan's first job was as a Junior Assistant Buyer at Macy's in New York City.

During World War II, she was asked to be a date at an event for a visiting naval servicemen. George Clucas was her blind date, and they married on her birthday in 1946. They were happily married for 63 years. George passed away in 2009. They had three children (Bob, Barbara, and Rich), three grandchildren, and five great-grandchildren. Soon after marrying, they moved to Ann Arbor, Michigan (too cold), then to Sacramento, California (too hot), and then in 1956 they settled in San Luis Obispo (just right), and she has been in California ever since!

While living in San Luis Obispo, George was employed by Cal Poly while Jan worked as a community activist and volunteer. Jan spent much of her time trying to further local and statewide civic issues, serving on numerous city and county planning and advisory committees. In 1961, she and a friend started the San Luis Obispo Chapter of the League of Women Voters, and Jan served as the first president. She also served as a chapter chair for the Santa Lucia Chapter of the Sierra Club and was honored for contributing to its formation. Jan briefly taught history at Cuesta College and was an active member of the Cal Poly Women's Club.

Jan and George traveled extensively throughout the United States, Europe, the Far East, Central America, and the South Pacific. Jan enjoys many interests including reading, listening to classical music, art (but not an artist), flower gardening, golfing, hiking on trails, keeping up with current events (always clipping articles), studying history, and writing her family history. She has a special love for animals, especially dogs.

Jan attended William and Mary in Virginia and then earned her Bachelor's Degree from UCLA and her Master's Degree in history from California State University, Long Beach.

The family has always had strong ties to Cal Poly. George taught there and also worked in administration. Interestingly, eight of the eleven children, grandchildren, and their spouses are graduates of Cal Poly.

Jan was welcomed to Sydney Creek in September, 2013. She enjoys participating in activities on a regular basis as well as keeping up on news and daily happenings with her neighborhood friends. Special planned outings and visits from her daughter and other family members are equally treasured.
